Civics is all around us. There is a lot to know about the government and how "We the People" interact with the government and each other. Let's help each other expand our civic literacy.

The opening paragraph of the U.S. Constitution is called the Preamble. It states:

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America." [spelling in the origina]

There is strength in the words, "We the People..." as they convey the source of power granted to the United States government under the U.S. Constitution. The words that follow "We the People" are equally important, as they outline what the government will do for the people it represents. These are the goals and purposes of government. The public's awareness of these goals and purposes is increased when there is a national crisis because the people turn to the government for guidance and assistance.
