completion of their appointed rounds." These words by the Greek historian, Herodotus, reflect the spirit of the postal service. It gets the job done, no matter what.

The U.S. Post Office is the trusted source to move government services between the government and the people. From the franking privilege of the United States Congress, to the Department of State relying on the Post Office for its passport services, to the delivery of election ballots at home Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds.

and abroad, the U.S. Postal Service is a safe way for the delivery of personal, official, and time sensitive mail.

The significance of the U.S. Post Office cannot be overestimated. For 245 years, it has been safeguarding our personal letters, augmenting our commercial enterprises, and helping to secure our democratic way of life. The framers of the U.S. Constitution understood this significance when they granted Congress the power to create a postal system in 1787 and it has continued to contribute to the growth of this nation ever since.



Even during this nation's most trying times, the U.S. Post Office has been relied upon to help carry American democracy forward.

Since the Civil War, when circumstances prevented soldiers from voting in-person, states created a process for absentee voting. This process depended upon the postal service to deliver a soldier's mail-in ballot securely and effectively to state election officials.

Since the Civil War, then, the U.S. Post Office has supported U.S. elections. Voting by mail has become an integral part of the electoral process, with all 50 states allowing it, and millions of eligible voters casting their votes by it.

As America prepares to vote during the COVID19 pandemic crisis, the creed of the U.S. Post Office remains important: "neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds."
