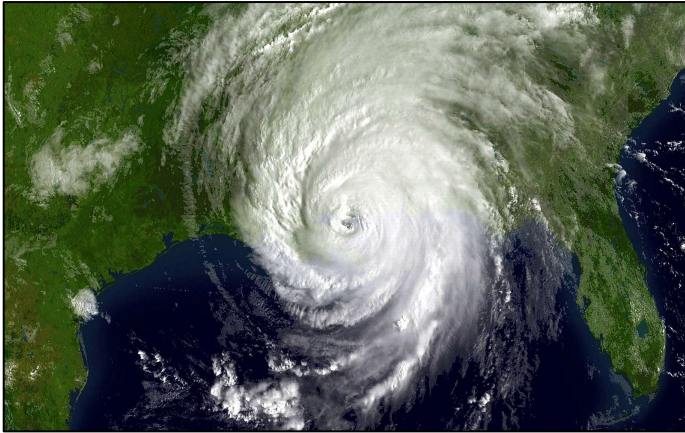


# Government Scenarios

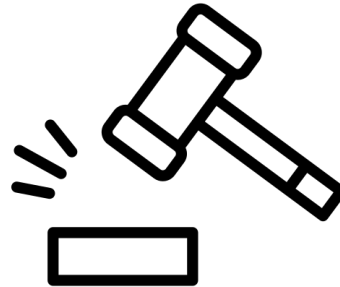
# Scenario 1

## Scenario 2

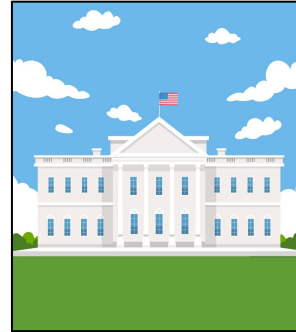
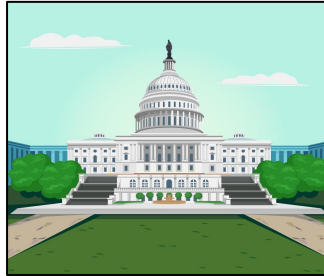
A U.S. Senator breaks the law, but believes that because they are in a position of power they are excused from any/all consequences.

The U.S. government is made up of three branches:

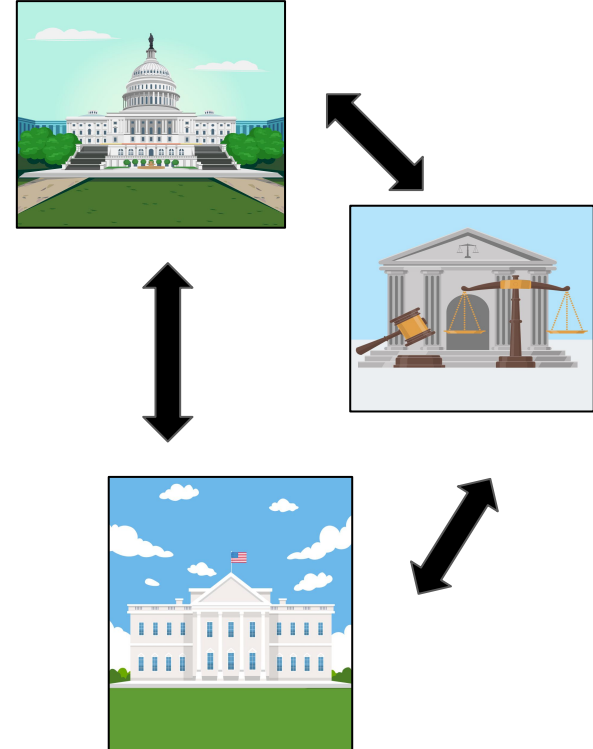
- Executive Branch

## Scenario 4

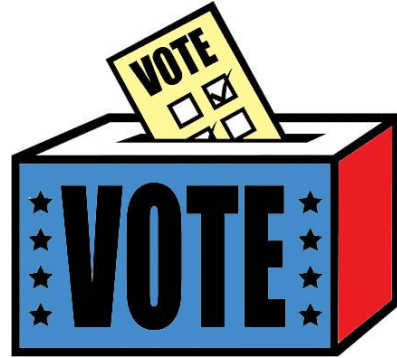
A new Supreme Court vacancy has just come up.
