BENCHMARK

SS.5.CG.2.4 Evaluate the importance of civic duties and responsibilities to the preservation of the United States' constitutional republic.

BENCHMARK CLARIFICATIONS

- Students will explain what it means for the United States to be a constitutional republic.
- Students will identify duties (e.g., obeying the law, paying taxes, serving on a jury) and responsibilities (e.g., voting, keeping informed on public issues) that citizens are expected to fulfill.
- Students will explain what could happen to the United States if citizens did not fulfill their civic duties and responsibilities.

	 Students will explain how public issues, such as taxation, roads, zoning, and schools impact citizens' daily lives. Students will describe how citizens can help solve community and state problems (e.g., attending government meetings, communicating with their elected representatives). SS.4.CG.2.2 Explain the importance of voting, public service, and volunteerism to the state and nation. Students will explain how voting, public service, and volunteerism contribute to the preservation of the republic. Students will discuss different types of public service and volunteerism.

TIMING/PACING NOTES

- This benchmark may be taught at any point during the school year.
- This benchmark may be taught alongside SS.5.CG.2.2, SS.5.CG.2.3, and SS.5.CG.2.5 to create a larger unit on civic and political participation.
- Benchmark clarification #1 may be taught with SS.5.CG.1.2 and SS.5.CG.1.3 as these address the foundations and establishment of the United States form of government.

UNDERSTANDING THE BENCHMARK

- → What to know:
 - Evaluate can mean: examine, explain, justify, or write
 - ◆ Explain can mean: write, connect, or justify
 - ◆ Identify can mean: list, name, or match
 - ◆ The term constitutional republic has been utilized in benchmarks beginning in second grade
 - The terms democracy and constitutional republic are not interchangeable
 - ◆ In the United States, citizenship comes with rights, obligations, and responsibilities
 - ◆ Civic duties are actions that citizens are required to take by law
 - Responsibilities are actions that citizens take in order to benefit their community
 - Many of the founders believed citizens must have certain civic virtues in order for the U.S. Constitution and system of government they established to work
- → Main concepts to teach:
 - ◆ The United States is a constitutional republic
 - Examples of civic duties
 - Examples of civic responsibilities
 - What could happen to the United States if citizens did not fulfill their civic duties and responsibilities
- → Examples:
 - Constitutional republic
 - A constitutional republic is a form of government in which there is democratic voting, but governmental power is limited by the existence of a constitution that protects the rights of citizens
 - Wording of the Pledge of Allegiance "...and to the Republic..."
 - Civic Duties
 - "Must Do"
 - Also referred to as obligations
 - Obeying the law, serving on juries, paying taxes, registering for Selective Service
 - ◆ Civic Responsibilities
 - "Nice to Do" (Responsible citizens should do these)
 - Informed voting, knowledge of public issues, attending civic meetings, volunteering, running for office
 - ◆ Implications of ignoring civic duties and responsibilities
 - Legal consequences for failing to show up to jury duty, breaking laws, not paying taxes, etc.
 - Hurt the common good
 - Chaos, lack of safety, no money for programs/services, no one to defend the nation, a government that represents only a few voices, difficulty making changes to benefit people, etc.
