

## **SAMPLE ANSWERS: Uniform Ballot Structure Video Viewing Guide**

Directions: While watching the Uniform Ballot Structure video, compile a list of 10 facts about Florida's uniform ballot structure and the process of participating in Florida elections.

These are just a few examples of what knowledge could be gathered through the video.

1.	In order to vote in FL, must be 18 years old, a resident of FL, and a U.S. Citizen
2.	Can lose voting rights if they're a convicted felon or declared mentally incompetent by a court
3.	Two types of elections: Primary and General
4.	Primary: candidate seeks political party nomination for office
5.	All ballots are in English first and then Spanish
6.	A closed primary system means only members of that party can vote in primary elections
7.	All election ballots in FL look the same (same ballot in each county)
8.	Run-off elections may occur if a candidate doesn't receive 51% (majority) of the votes
9.	Public measures can also be on a ballot for registered voters to vote on
10.	Two different ballots for primary and general elections
