
## CIVICS IN Conspiracy to Commit REAL LIFE Bribery and the Rule of Law

On September 22, 2023, U.S. Senator Bob Menendez (D, NJ), and his wife, Nadine, were indicted by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York and charged with conspiracy to commit bribery, conspiracy to commit honest services fraud, and conspiracy to commit extortion under the color of official right. They are expected to have their first appearance in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York, Wednesday, September 27.

The indictment is a culmination of a months-long investigation by federal authorities. Contained as part of the indictment were images taken from an FBI search of the Senator's home, in which nearly \$500,000 in cash, \$150,000 worth of gold bars, and a 2019 Mercedes-Benz convertible were

found, suspected proceeds from Senator and Mrs. Menendez's massive bribery scheme. So, what are these charges about, what do they mean, and why do they matter?

Conspiracy to commit bribery is just what it sounds like. Senator Menendez is accused of accepting money or other incentives to pursue legislation and take actions that were intended not to benefit the United States or his constituents. Rather, these actions would benefit only the person giving him the bribe, or the country they represented. This is directly connected to the conspiracy to commit honest services fraud. Honest services fraud is most often used to describe a broad spectrum of unethical conduct on the part of public officials, which reflects the actions that Senator Menendez is accused of taking.



Perhaps the most impactful crime that the Senator is accused of is conspiracy to commit extortion under the color of official right. This is when someone "...induced, obtained, accepted, or agreed to accept a payment to which he or she was not entitled, knowing that the payment was made in return for taking, withholding, or influencing official acts." The senator is accused of having interfered in the legal system, using the power and influence of his office to try and protect individuals charged with significant crimes, among other things.

So why does this all matter? Ultimately, it is important that we rely on our Constitution and the rule of law to ensure that all citizens, regardless of position, are held to the same standard and receive the same treatment under the law, and Senator Menendez and his wife are no exceptions. We allow the judicial process, including a jury of our peers to determine guilt, as appropriate, in our constitutional republic. By doing so, we uphold our founding principles, especially the rule of law, and the rights and liberties of all citizens.
